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this book covers a broad chronological range of writing and theorising about ekphrasis extending the subject to include literary works on photography and prose descriptions of artworks

what neural processes underlie the appreciation of painting music and dance how did such processes evolve this book brings together experts in genetics psychology neuroimaging neuropsychology art history and philosophy to explore these questions it sets the stage for a cognitive neuroscience of art and aesthetics

what is art what counts as an aesthetic experience does art have to beautiful can one reasonably dispute about taste what is the relation between aesthetic and moral evaluations how to interpret a work of art in conversations on art and aesthetics hans maes discusses these and other key questions in aesthetics with ten world leading philosophers of art the exchanges are direct open and sharp and give a clear account ofthese thinkers core ideas and intellectual development they also offer new insights into and a deeper understanding of contemporary issues in the philosophy of art

life as art brings the resources of contemporary aesthetics since nietzsche to bear on the problems of how one integrates the aesthetic emphases of meaning liberation and creativity into one s daily life by linking together the aesthetic and ethical accounts of critical theorists phenomenologists and existentialists into a coherent view on the artful life

life as art shows the ways in which much of contemporary continental theory has been concerned with alternative ways of constructing one's own life seen as a unified phenomenon life as art signifies an active attempt to create a life which bears the resistance openness and creativity found in artworks

joseph kupfer removes aesthetics from the exclusive province of museums concert halls and the periphery of human interests to reveal the impact of aesthetic experience on daily living he combines philosophical aesthetics and critical analysis to indicate the status of aesthetic values in ordinary life showing how aesthetic qualities and relations contribute to social moral and personal values in examining the practical implications of aesthetic values for sports sexual relationships violence and education kupfer also looks at the effect of aesthetic deprivation

this book provides an accessible introduction to aesthetics especially in relation to literature and is particularly useful for readers new to literary theory and contemporary philosophy anne sheppard discusses what it is that all works of art have in common what gives them their value as art and asks wisely whether there can ever be one correct interpretation of a work of art the scope of the book includes chapters on form beauty and aesthetic appreciation and the relationship between art and morals

by analyzing the three loci of aesthetics the subjective the objective and the absolute the author concludes that only the sublime demonstrates that art is neither subjective nor objective the one essential component of art is the new the sole instrument that can guarantee art's vitality even when confronted by the nihilistic tendencies of modernity

why is that art addresses common questions that viewers raise about contemporary art why is that art why is it in an art museum who says it's art if i did this would it be art why is it good covering a broad diverse and engaging sampling of works abstract and representational painting monumental sculpture performance art video installations films and photographs author terry barrett responds to these questions using three sources the artists who created the works philosophers of art and art critics introducing students to a variety of established theories of art he presents the traditional sets of criteria of realism expressionism and formalism which are in turn updated by recent sources of poststructuralism barrett applies each of these theories to challenging works of contemporary art pointing out the strengths and weaknesses of each mode of interpretation he encourages students to consider many criteria when evaluating an artwork to critically examine judgments made by others and to make informed judgments of their own ideal for courses in aesthetics art theory art criticism and the philosophy of art why is that art is organized chronologically according to the history of aesthetics it features sixty seven illustrations twenty six in a full color insert discusses a wide range of american and european artists and includes an exceptional overview of postmodern pluralism this unique book will provide students with a newfound appreciation for contemporary art scholarship and reasoned argumentation giving them the confidence to join the fascinating discourse on contemporary art

this book shows that art involves an aesthetics of self becoming wherein we do not simply consume artistic meaning but become empowered by adapting ourselves to what creation in the different art forms makes possible paul crowther argues that the great political task in aesthetics is no longer the creation of political art as such but rather the winning back of art and aesthetics as central societal concerns this involves the overcoming of neo liberal treatments of art as mere commodity and misguided attitudes that dismiss it as the product of dead white european males the book begins with a theory of self consciousness which reveals the necessary role played by the aesthetic in personal identity it then emphasises how art forms empower through processes of making and aesthetic effects that are unique to them individually to show this he considers the ontology of pictorial art sculpture installation and assemblage works architecture literature cinema and music his arguments concerning these are supported throughout by in depth discussions of specific artworks the book s effect overall is to reorientate aesthetics by showing how art empowers through its revelation of new possibilities of experience the aesthetics of self becoming will appeal to philosophers of art and aesthetics as well as scholars in art history literary studies film studies and music theory who are interested in the book s central concerns

art has the capacity to shape and alter our identities it can influence who and what we are those who have had aesthetic experiences know this intimately and yet the study of art s impact on the mind struggles to be recognized as a centrally important field within the discipline of psychology the main thesis of art and identity is that aesthetic experience represents a prototype for meaningful experience warranting intense philosophical and psychological investigation currently psychology remains too closed off from

the rich reflection of philosophical aesthetics while philosophy continues to be sceptical of the psychological reduction of art to its potential for subjective experience at the same time philosophical aesthetics cannot escape making certain assumptions about the psyche and benefits from entering into a dialogue with psychology art and identity brings together philosophical and psychological perspectives on aesthetics in order to explore how art creates minds

during the intellectual and cultural flowering of scotland in the 18th century few subjects attracted as much interest among men of letters as aesthetics the study of art from the subjective perspective of human experience all of the great philosophers of the age hutcheson hume smith and reid addressed themselves to aesthetic questions their inquiries revolved around a cluster of issues the nature of taste beauty and the sublime how qualitative differences operate upon the mind through the faculty of taste and how aesthetic sensibility can be improved through education this volume brings together and provides contextual introductions to the most significant 18th century writing on the philosophy of art from the pioneering study of beauty by francis hutcheson through hume's seminal essays on the standard of taste and tragedy to the end of the tradition in dugald stewart we are swept up in the debate about art and its value that fascinated the philosophers of enlightenment scotland and continues to do so to this day

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the space that separates a realist theory of art radically challenges our assumptions about what art is what art does who is doing it and why it matters rejecting the modernist and market driven misconception that art is only what artists do wilson instead presents a realist case for living artfully art is defined as the skilled practice of giving shareable form to our experiences of being in relation with the real that is to say the causally generative domain of the world that extends beyond our direct observation comprising relations structures mechanisms possibilities powers processes systems forces values ways of being in communicating such aesthetic experience we behold life's betweenness the space that separates so coming to know ourselves as connected providing the first dedicated and comprehensive account of art and aesthetics from a critical realist perspective aesthetic critical realism as wilson argues for a profound paradigm shift in how we understand and care for culture in terms of our systems of value recognition fortunately we have just the right tool to help us achieve this transformation and it's called art offering novel explanatory accounts of art aesthetic experience value play culture creativity artistic truth and beauty this book will appeal to a wide audience of students and scholars of art aesthetics human development philosophy and critical realism as well as cultural practitioners and policy makers

this study attempts to gain information concerning the receptive as opposed to the creative aesthetic experience by talking to museum professionals who spend their working lives identifying appraising and explicating works of art the study is based on an underlying assumption that rules and practices for looking at art exist and must be mastered if

success is to ensue the anthropological research approach uses semi structured interviews and subjects the responses to systematic analysis major conclusions emphasize the unity and diversity of the aesthetic experience the structure of the aesthetic experience is found to be an intense involvement of attention in response to a visual stimulus for no other reason than to sustain the interaction the experiential consequences of such a deep and autotelic involvement are an intense enjoyment characterized by feelings of personal wholeness a sense of discovery and a sense of human connectedness the aesthetic content requires two sets of preconditions that make the experience possible the challenges contained in the object and the skills of the viewer while the structure of the aesthetic experience is rated similar in terms by all the respondents the challenges or content stimuli that triggers the experience vary considerably these challenges of art are the formal structure of the work its emotional impact the intellectual references it carries and the opportunities it creates for a dialogue among the artist his time and the viewer without this content challenge there would be nothing to arrest the viewer and consequently no experience level of skill is critical challenges and skill must be nearly in balance for the attention to become focused a complex work of art will engage only a person who has developed complex visual skills the book is divided into six chapters and concludes with appendices interview questions for museum professionals and aesthetic experience questionnaire form contains approximately 100 references mm

theodor adorno s aesthetic theory 1970 offers one of the most powerful and comprehensive critiques of art and of the discipline of aesthetics ever written the work offers a deeply critical engagement with the history and philosophy of aesthetics and with the traditions of european art through the middle of the 20th century it is coupled with ambitious claims about what aesthetic theory ought to be but the cultural horizon of adorno s aesthetic theory was the world of high modernism and much has happened since then both in theory and in practice adorno s powerful vision of aesthetics calls for reconsideration in this light must his work be defended updated resisted or simply left behind this volume gathers new essays by leading philosophers critics and theorists writing in the wake of adorno in order to address these questions they hold in common a deep respect for the power of adorno s aesthetic critique and a concern for the future of aesthetic theory in response to recent developments in aesthetics and its contexts

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
